Vacation, but not from church

Sharon, Kristin, Amanda and I are heading off with another family for a vacation in Maine this month.

This was us last year in Ogunquit. You can see quite obviously who was the only one who needed a restful vacation! Yup, the good looking guy in the bright vellow swim trunks. Now I enjoy my time at the beach with family and friends, just as I am sure you do. This year, however, is the

first time in an awfully long time that I am taking a weekend off for my vacation. This means I will not be able to come to church in Hatfield, but that does not mean that I will not be going to church. And no, I'm not talking about communing with God as I listen to the waves lapping up on the beach. I'm talking about going to church, sitting with other church goers, listening to church music and paying attention to church messages. When you are in church at 9:30am in Hatfield, Sharon and I will be in church with Rev. Anna Copeland and Rev. Dan Hollis in York, Maine. What I'm trying to say is that vacations do not have to imply vacations from church.

I know I am in the business of church; I get paid to go to church. However, long before I was in the business of church, I was a part of church. I know the statistics. When young adults head off to college, they often stop practicing their faith, whatever their faith may be, but I went to church more. It was right there on campus so I literally went every day of the week except for Saturdays. And it was not even the church denomination I belonged to at the time, but it was church. It was not only people coming together; it was people called together by Jesus.

I went to Brandeis University. I was talking the other evening with my old roommate. He remembers his father's agitation when our tuition and room and board crossed the \$10,000 mark. I'm so old that it's now seven times as expensive to attend

the same school. Brandeis is a secular Jewish university. Its Jewish roots inspire and influence, but



do not overshadow any other belief or lack thereof. This was symbolized beautifully in the construction of

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their chapels. The three buildings are designed to represent the open book of Holy Scripture, and intentionally, no chapel casts a shadow over any other chapel, and just as intentionally, the three chapels surround a heart-shaped pond, the message being that all of these faiths come together around a common message of God's love.

When I first arrived in South Deerfield as a pastor back in 1988, another local pastor took me out to lunch. I remember him saying that church is any building with pews and an organ. This was not meant to be a dogmatic statement. He meant in his euphemistic way that church is church regardless of doctrine or denomination. This was his way of expressing no chapel casting a shadow upon another chapel and all called together by God's love.

Organized religion can be a force of violence, subjection and ignorance. I know this, and it embarrasses me greatly. Organized religion can also be liberating, uplifting and a powerful advocate for community and change. The latter is why I go to church on vacation and why I chose to be in the business of church.

I know many people are very successful at being good people without church, but church can challenge people to be better people. If I listen to the waves, I can feel God. I used to go on retreats along Long Island Sound. It was not hard to feel God there as I stood by myself. However, if that's all I did, the repetition of the gentle waves could be just like the repetition of my own thoughts. Then God is not holy as in wholly other, and others are not necessarily holy. Church challenges me to know God better and to act like I know God better, and church is Jesus' called community. The community helps me to realize that many and different do not offend God, and that is a message we can't preach enough.

Anniversary Celebrations

New Life From Old Stories: Anniversary Celebrations That Make a Difference

A church anniversary celebration is an opportunity to make meaningful and creative connections with the congregation's history. It's a time to learn more about the people who founded and led the church, and about the events that have shaped its unique personality. Even more, it is a chance to learn more about the larger Christian and Congregational traditions.

The Congregational Library at 14 Beacon Street in Boston provides a variety of resources on their website (<u>www.congregationallibrary.org</u>) and, for those signed up for our email alerts, information about conference calls and webinars on anniversary planning.

Some Time-Tested Suggestions on Planning Church Anniversary Celebrations

- Begin well in advance. Three or four years ahead of the event is not too soon!
- Create a core committee of creative and hardworking people, with a good representation across the age spectrum. History buffs are welcome, but so are good ideas of all kinds.
- Plan a celebration that goes beyond your church doors. An anniversary is an opportunity to re-introduce yourselves to your town or neighborhood, to build connections with other churches and community or-ganizations, and to include them in the story you tell about yourselves.
- The resources available at <u>www.historysmiths.com</u> and similar organizations will be useful here.
- Involve the entire congregation in an oral history project.
- Use the resources at the Congregational Library to learn the bigger story behind your local one. Members have access to a full set of PowerPoint videos on Congregational Christian history. The online catalog also contains a wealth of information, much of it in digital form or available for borrowing by Library members.
- Think creatively about events that are fun and inspirational. Such as:
- Write a pageant about your church's founding
- Put together a scrapbook
- Commission a hymn or special music
- Create a timeline (church, community, and national events)
- Organize a book club around historical themes
- o Make a commemorative quilt
- Designate a special gift to an organization that your church played a role in establishing

Writing a Church History that People Will Read

Our pamphlet, <u>Writing a Church History That People Will Read</u>, provides tips on research, organizing information, and editing, and suggests resources for publishing your final product.

Our collection will be helpful in pulling together your story. If you are close enough to Boston to come in for a visit, Library staff are always happy to assist with research. We have many town and county histories and a very large collection of local church histories for you to consult. Our sermon collection may well include one or two from a past minister. There are many digital resources on our website, including denominational year-books which will show, for example, names of clergy. Our obituary database provides search information on some 29,000 ministers and missionaries.

Organizing and maintaining good church records

An anniversary year is the time to get your church archive in order. The Library can help with tips and guidelines for creating and maintaining old records. Our members have access to a PowerPoint video on records management, and we also provide a written a guide for churches, <u>Managing Church Records</u>. Our archivists are always ready and willing to help with your records management questions.

Churches with very old records (up to 1800 in most cases) are eligible for <u>our Hidden Histories program</u>. We provide free digitizing and secure, climate-controlled space in our archives. Please <u>contact our digital archivist</u> for more information.

BENEVOLENCE NEWS
