61st Anniversary

The United Church of Christ (UCC) was born on June 25, 1957. Our denomination is relatively young. This may seem incongruous in a congregation dating to 1670, and in an historical denomination that begins with the Pilgrims and the Puritans.

The UCC was formed by the merger of two denominations that were each formed by the previous merger of two other denominations. The Congregational Churches and the Christian Churches united on June 17, 1931 to form the Congregational Christian Churches. Both denominations emphasized freedom of religious expression and belief, and the autonomy of the local churches.

Three years later the Reformed Church in the United States and the Evangelical Synod of North America merged on June 26, 1934, forming the Evangelical and Reformed Church. These two denominations embodied the Reformed and Lutheran traditions of the Reformation.

Both merged-denominations shared a strong commitment to freedom of religious expression and thought dating back to important church reformers such as John Wyclif in the 14th century, John Hus in the 15th, and Martin Luther in the 16th. This common tradition led a 1937 study-group of clergy from these denominations to speak of a sense of "family."

The study group did not leave this alone as a "feel good" moment. They followed-up with a telegram to church leadership inquiring about the possibility of "looking forward to union." The telegram was met favourably and four years of private discussion on the topic followed.

The Basis of Union emerged from these discussions in 1943 (http://www.ucc.org/beliefs basis-of-union). This document was the blueprint for each denomination's own demise and their re-creation as the UCC. In its Preamble, Christian unity is sacrosanct to the point of their own denominational elimination so as to achieve the greater good of a united and uniting church. Each denomination accepted the wording of "and, if need be, die" in order to confront "the divisions and hostilities of our world" so that they could reconcile with each other and erase the scandal of Christian division.

The *Basis of Union* was ratified and a uniting General Synod was called in 1950, but legal injunctions prevented this from happening for another seven years. Finally, in 1957, a Uniting General Synod was convened of the two denominations, and on June 25th "as with faith in God and growing trust in one another" the UCC was born.

Once united, the UCC then called for the commissioning of a *Statement of Faith* (http://www.ucc.org/beliefs statement-of-faith). The *Statement* was presented to the next General Synod in 1959 and endorsed. The heritage of religious freedom manifests itself in the fact that the *Statement's* original language has been modified on two separate occasions to date. Creeds are not meant to last unchanged forever so that the particular words rather than their meaning and message become enshrined. They are meant to reflect the lived faith of the community in each generation.

The Statement reflects also another core tenet of the <u>United</u> Church of Christ – covenant. Covenant is the opposite of coercion. It is the framework that allows for freedom of thought and expression, and paradoxically for the union born out of the mutual respect for such freedom. This shared trust is the deeply held conviction of the church that allows for union and diversity to coexist in a meaningful and energetic fashion.

A principal spiritual motivation of the UCC is summarized in the quote from John's Gospel: "That they may all be one" (17:21) The historical process of becoming the UCC and the intentional, on-going inclusiveness of its ministry and theology are a living expression of our faith. Two centuries ago, Philip Schaff taught that all churches are incomplete by their very nature. An historical progression is taking place under the guidance of the Holy Spirit toward the unity Jesus promised. The recently deceased Gabriel Fackre distinguished the UCC from dogmatic churches by saying: "Our eye [is] fixed on the horizon rather than the heritage." This month we celebrate our 61st anniversary as a church inspired by what we are becoming. This is exciting and uncertain. Who knows where the Spirit will lead, but ours is the privilege to follow and to become together.

JUNE FOOD DRIVE

CHILDREN'S SUNDAY

On June 10th we will observe Children's Sunday. On this day, Bibles will be presented to those children moving from third to fourth grades. During the Service, we acknowledge and thank the ones who lead our Sunday School. We will also ask the youth to participate in the Service by taking on some of the roles needed during worship. We hope that all of our young people will be in church on this day.

ALL CHURCH PICNIC

A church family picnic will take place after our Service on June 10th. Weather permitting, we will gather on the lawn behind the church. The church will provide the drinks, hamburgers, kielbasa, watermelon, chicken and hot dogs. If you prefer veggie burgers, make sure to contact Linda Milewski.

Those attending are asked to bring a side dish to share with each other and also bring a lawn chair or a blanket from home to sit on. If your children will be playing with the hose, make sure to bring a towel also. Donations will be accepted, but this is not intended as a fundraiser, but rather as an opportunity to come together as the community of our church.

BIBLE STUDY GROUP

We are reading from the oldest Gospel, which is the Gospel of Mark. It is in this Gospel that we have the first written attempt to tell the story of Jesus' life and ministry. This is the first account of the earliest Christians

who are trying to remember and convey the oral stories that they had heard and shared about Jesus. We are reaching back into the infancy of our faith and seeing how what we believe was born. If you would like to come and join us as we read, discuss and share our thoughts about these biblical passages, please feel free to pop-in. No prior Bible knowledge is required, only a desire to know the Bible better.

ANNUAL MEETING MASSACHUSETTS CONFERENCE

The Second Tri-Conference Annual Meeting will take place June 15 - 16, 2018 at the Mass Mutual Center, Springfield, MA. The theme of the Conference is: "Hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us." (Romans 5:5) In the invitation shared, it states: "These are indeed times filled with hope as we – the Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island Conferences – consider voting to form a new, united conference with the hope of making our region a more just, loving, and compassionate place." In addition to the business to be conducted at the Conference, there will be dynamic worship and a keynote address by the Rev. FATHER'S DAY



NEW SOUND SYSTEM INSTALLED

A new sound system has been installed in the church at a cost of \$3,020.00. This upgrade improves the sound quality through the church speakers, allows for hearing assist packs for the hard of hearing, installs a portable handheld microphone for when needed, dedicates a portable microphone for the celebrant, and allows for a direct link to the camera when we videotape our Services. If we invest an additional \$1120, we could upgrade to better new microphones, have the electronic piano hardwired into the system and set-up a remote camera station in the balcony.
