"And they said nothing to anyone"

At last month's Super Saturday gathering at Minachaug High School, Rev. Shannon Wall recited the entirety of Mark's Gospel from memory — a two hour effort! Rev. Wall is a Yale trained actor. Her recitation was compelling and emotion-filled. Sitting in that high school classroom, I could see that the others, like myself, were drawn into the story.

I especially remember her portrayal of Jesus' words as He found the disciples sleeping in the Garden of Gethsemane. I realize she's a professionally trained actor, but she's also an ordained minister who has felt a calling to serve Christ as her life's vocation.

I could not tell if "Jesus" was on the verge of tears or if she was on the verge of tears as she recited the Gospel words: "'Could you not keep awake one hour?'" Jesus' isolation in this terrible hour was palpable. His desperation was not only heard; it was felt.

The horror of Jesus' capture, torture and death, thankfully, gave way to the mystery of Easter morning. Rev. Shannon narrated the story with a note of apprehension, telling us that the women left for the tomb at dawn to anoint Jesus' dead body. Along the way they worried about how to get into the tomb.

Then her voice became excited as the women discovered that the tomb was unsealed. I think us Christians sitting in the high school classroom associated that tone with the approaching revelation of the resurrection.

However, being faithful to the text which says that the women "were alarmed," the excitement sprang more from fear than from emerging hope. "A young man, dressed in a white robe" informed the women that Jesus had been raised from the dead, "He is not here."

So again, as Christians sitting in a high school classroom, but maybe not all that familiar with biblical idiosyncrasies, we're getting ready for Easter joy. Rev. Shannon continues to recite the text for us: "So [the women] went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid."

Then she quickly walked out of the classroom. At this point people in the classroom were wondering for a moment or two if she was coming back. Was this the end of a scene or was this the end of the Gospel? I watched as two very intent women in the front row took out their Bibles to see what had just happened.

We have grown so familiar with the aggregate of the resurrection story told by all of the Evangelists that we can miss the drama of Mark's final words, and his were the first and only Gospel words for maybe a decade.

Mark shares no resurrection appearances with us. The women do not share their experience of the

other endings were added on to it at different times.

But let's leave the tradition bound additions aside and consider instead Mark's poignant ending at 16:8. The oral presentation of the Gospel shared with us the experience of hearing it for the first time. Our shock at its abrupt conclusion would have been like the shock of the first generation. That may be intentional. Mark may be trying to convey to his readers the bewildering encounter that confronted the first witnesses to the resurrection. They were unable to process what had happened. Amazement and fear are honest reactions.

The readers of Mark's Gospel, however, know that the news did get out. They are evidence of that fact. Mark's surprise ending, though, may share the message that the resurrection must be experienced firsthand. It must be a personal awakening. It must be what the philosopher William James called eureka moments: "Unclamp, in a word, your intellectual and practical machinery, and let it run free" Easter is not learned; Easter is experienced. It is transformative. Others, like Mark, can lead us to the empty tomb, but the resurrection is personal. I invite you to join other resurrection people at our Easter worship to help us all experience the wonder that the empty tomb confronts us with still today.

HOLY WEEK

Palm Sunday is April 14th this year. On this first day of Holy Week, palms will be shared with those at church to commemorate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem to shouts of "Hosanna," which is a Hebrew exclamation begging God to save. It was shouted joyously at Jesus with the expectation that He would be a triumphant Messiah king who would free the Jews from their Roman oppressors. When Jesus rejects the people's demands for a militant Saviour, they turn against Him quickly, thus leading to the events later in Holy Week.

Maundy Thursday falls on the 18th. The name Maundy Thursday is derived from the Latin word mandatum (command) and refers to the biblical passage: "A new commandment I give unto you: That you love one an-

other, as I have loved you, that you also the example of humble service at the disciples. We are likewise to practice a Christ. This is our "new commandment."

Maundy Thursday is also the day when Supper when He sat at table with His and "This is my blood," and then

Jesus instituted the Sacrament of the Lord's closest followers and said, "This is my body" commanded "Do this in remembrance of

me." We will recreate that setting in our Service as we then invite everyone in attendance to share in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. On this solemn night we will also remember loved ones who have passed on to their eternal reward.

The church will be open much of the day on Good Friday. This is the church's most solemn of days. This is when we remember the tortured death of Jesus on the cross. Mark's Gospel tells us that Jesus was nailed to the cross at 9AM, at noon darkness covered the land, and finally at 3PM Jesus died. Reflecting this passage, the church will be open for quiet times of private prayer and meditation from 9AM - 3:30pm. If you are unable to come to church on Good Friday, please make every effort to keep this day solemn wherever you may be. This is a day of humble gratitude and reflection, not a time for dinner out or anything frivolous. Jesus dies for all of us on this sacred day. We should respect this no matter where we are or what we are doing.

EASTER SUNDAY

The Gospels tell us that by the time the women arrived at Jesus' burial tomb on Easter Sunday that it was already empty. Jesus had resurrected from the dead and with that everything in God's good creation changes. God's revelation in Jesus of Nazareth is vindicated. Death is conquered. We become a people no longer defined by our physical mortality. And God's ineffable graciousness in the life and even death of Christ Jesus ends in triumph and charge as we are the ones who are called upon to share this glorious news with all the world.
