A World Changing Event ... No, Not the Pandemic

During this month of April, we remember Jesus' crucifixion. This was supposed to be the end of His story. He should have been forgotten by history. The New Testament refers to the presence of other would-be Messiahs, but they fade from memory (Acts 5:33+). Messianic hopes were high in Israel at the time. The Maccabees were not long past. The Temple was being rebuilt. There were pagans occupying the Temple Mount in Fortress Antonia.

The charge against Jesus was nailed to His cross. From that very moment it became an unexpected double entendre. For the Romans "Jesus of Nazareth King of the Jews" was a political indictment. Jesus' crucifixion was meant to show all who passed in and out of Jerusalem during the Passover festival that this is what happens to anyone who dares to challenge the authority of the Empire.

For believers, however, this Messianic title came to mean so much more. Rather than silencing Jesus, the cross set an example for people of faith to speak truth to power in His name. The once timid and terrified apostles are soon proclaiming in the halls of power: "'We must obey God rather than any human authority. The God of our ancestors raised up Jesus, whom you had killed by hanging him on a tree." (Acts. 5:29-30) The charge nailed to the cross that was supposed to silence Jesus instead gave Him and His gospel new life.

In Matthew's Gospel, the phrase "king of the Jews" bookends the story of Jesus' life. The Magi employ it in their search the newborn king. Then it disappears from the text only to reappear at the time of Jesus' crucifixion. Everything written about Him between these bookends, which is His life story, defines His kingship. The cross was never limited to Jesus' death. The cross is Jesus' final living testimony to everything He preached and lived.

The cross was the world's rejection of God's revelation in Jesus. The world would not tolerate His gospel so it killed Him. But the cross, and our inspiration from the cross, are the not the end of Jesus' story. The women disciples went to the place of death after the Sabbath had passed. It was early Sunday morning and that's when they discovered that the tomb was open and empty.

Acts records some of the earliest Christian testimony about how the first believers processed this mystery: "'But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power'" (2:24) The world passed its judgment against Jesus and nailed Him to the cross and threw His battered, dead body in a nearby tomb, but God overturned this judgment and vindicated everything Jesus lived and preached by raising Him up from the grave to be seated in heavenly glory.

Just as the cross is not limited to Jesus' death so the empty tomb is not limited to Jesus' resurrection.

everything Jesus did and said. We short-change Easter by only thinking of it as assurance of life-after-death. Easter grants meaning and purpose, joy and hope to this life.

There has not been a pandemic like this for a century. We live in a world-changing time. Uncertainty is everywhere. Expectations will change. Look at the people who lived through the Depression in the 1930's. They saved and scrimped for the rest of their lives. Now that toilet paper has to be searched for on often empty shelves, we will look at the world differently from this point forward too. This pandemic will change us long after a vaccine has been discovered.

Things we once counted certain, whether it be our 401K's, our careers, our health are all a bit wobbly at present. But there was another life-altering, world changing event that we all continue to experience. It's our faith that the tomb was empty, that Jesus lives, that as He says at the end of Matthew, "'Remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.'" This month as we remember the climactic events of Jesus' last days and of His forever days, let us find strength and renewal in them. Let our faith become the foundation in our lives when so many others have cracked. Let us live lives transformed by the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

HOLY WEEK

Even in the throes of a pandemic, Holy Week is Holy Week. This is the period on the church's liturgical calendar when we remember the final events of to the pandemic, I will bless palms in church them at the side entrance off Billings Way enough time, and you as well, to return home for our 10AM Virtual Worship Service.

Palm Sunday is the day the church commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. The people hail Him with shouts of "Hosanna," which means "Save, I pray." They are looking to Jesus as their Saviour. They are hoping that Jesus will be who they want Him to be, a military leader, someone who will free them from Roman occupation by the power of God's sword. Here is an important lesson for us as people of faith. Jesus is our Saviour, but it is on God's terms, not our own.

A virtual Service will be conducted on **Maundy Thursday**. On this day, the church commemorates Jesus' Last Supper and His institution of Holy Communion. We will not be able to gather in our church for this moving Service. We will not be able to share in Communion together. Due to the extenuating circumstances of our times, I will say the words of our Communion Service in my home, and I invite you to gather at the table via our virtual Service and to have prepared a bit of juice or wine and some bread. In this way, we will be able to share Communion together, not physically, but spiritually.

The name Maundy Thursday is derived from the Latin word for commandment (mandatum). During the Last

Supper, as Jesus washes the feet of His servant, He says, love one another, as I have loved you, 13:34) "Love one another" is the lasting
