The Christmas Prequels

There are a lot of prequels out there. When a story of some sort gets traction and takes off, and an audience gathers, they tend to ask where it all began. The audience has become invested in characters and they want to know the untold stories of how they came to be the people they know.

Biblical scholars consider the Christmas stories to be prequels. You'll find nothing of the Christmas stories in the Epistles. They are not there in the last written canonical Gospel, John's. And the earliest Gospel, the Gospel of Mark, begins with Jesus as an adult heading out to the Judean desert to be baptized by John the Baptist.

And Mark begins his story of Jesus by writing, "The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." (1:1) For Mark, literally, the beginning is the start of Jesus' public ministry. Anything before that is akin to asking what there was before the Big Bang. For Mark, the prequel questions have not yet been asked or imagined.

Add about a decade to Christianity's timeline and there has been enough time for believers to become interested in the Jesus before He went public.

Scholars postulate that the original form of Luke's Gospel began at 3:1. This explains the detailed chronological setting as Luke tells the story of John the Baptist and Jesus' baptism – just like Mark did at the beginning of his Gospel.

This leaves them to teach that the first two chapters are a later prequel added onto the original Luke, that they were added after Luke's Gospel had been written, and this is where we find one of the two distinctive and irreconcilable Christmas stories.

In Luke, the Holy Family must travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem. Jesus is born in a manger and we gather for Christmas Eve worship because the angels announce His birth to shepherds "keeping watch over their flock by night" (2:8) They remain in Bethlehem for at least 40 days to account for Jesus' presentation in the Temple,

and then they return "to their own town of Nazareth." (2:39)

Matthew has no story of traveling from Nazareth, no manger, no shepherds nor angelic chorus. Matthew has the Magi of indeterminate number and the Bethlehem star leading them to Jesus' "house." (2:11) This account gives the impression of more permanence than that of the Lucan travelers. Jesus is born in Bethlehem because Joseph and Mary are from Bethlehem.

Rather than go back home to Nazareth after 40 days, as in Luke, Matthew tells of the Holy Family fleeing into Egypt for an extended period of time until after Herod dies. Then, discovering that Herod's son is on the throne, they decide it's not safe to remain in Bethlehem so they seek protection in the distant, unfamiliar village of Nazareth.

What we have here are two different stories of Jesus' birth and childhood. Biblical scholars call such accounts legends. They need not be made out of whole cloth. They knit together inherited, authentic, meaningful traditions in ways that make sense. They share these legends not as historical fact, but as vehicles to teach lessons.

The Christmas prequels emphasize the humanity of Jesus. Shortly after His life, some believers were so affronted by Jesus' crucifixion that they taught His human nature was all an illusion. The Christmas stories emphasize Jesus' real human nature. Jesus is one of us for all of us.

The extraordinary nature of Jesus is also trumpeted, this through angels and heavenly phenomenon. Even so, Jesus comes for the humble, the poor, the ordinary by being born in an animal's barn in one story and by fleeing worldly powers in the other.

We do not know the particulars of Jesus' birth and childhood, but we can believe in the message of these inspired legends, these prequels, that Jesus' birth as the "Son of God" (Mark 1:1) was ordinary and that is unabashedly extraordinary. He is Immanuel, "God with us."

SEASON OF ADVENT

The Season of Advent begins on December 3rd and this year it actually concludes on Christmas Eve morning. Its four Sundays represent the putative 4,000 years that the world awaited the Messiah's birth from Adam to Jesus.



Similarly, we wait during Advent and prepare ourselves to celebrate the joyous mystery of Christmas. On the four Advent Sundays, we will light the candles of the Advent Wreath. They represent the Advent themes of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love, in that order. The symbol of the Advent Wreath's increasing light reminds us that the Light of the World is coming to us on Christmas.

Advent's waiting is not simply biding time. Advent is a period of spiritual preparations. We are to focus on preparing our souls to be the new mangers for the coming Christ Child. The other preparations for Christmas began long before Advent's first Sunday, and they can become all-consuming. However, they can also be a distraction. They focus our attention on Christmas preparations that are important and joyous, but may have nothing to do with the Christ Child. Advent seeks

to give us the place and time to ponder the mystery of the Incarnation, of God entering the world in the reality of a humble, human child, of God entering the world as one of us for all of us.

I do hope that you will join us for Advent worship as part of your Christmas preparations. And as the baby Jesus came for all people, please think about sharing an invitation with those you know who may not be active church folk so that they too can join us at worship because the gift of Jesus is meant to be shared broadly.

ADVENT BULLETINS


