Summer-Time

I know Sharon enjoys the summer opportunity to take a longer walk with our dog after she gets home from work, a possibility that just is not there in the darkness of Standard Time. Slowing down makes me feel guilty, but that's my peccadillo. I smile because it makes me think of my grandfather who thought all clergy were lazy, but he had his reasons.

But the gift of summer-time is one that we can use and still enjoy. I am thinking specifically of the sum-



mer-time gift of picking up a book and reading. It is a shame that books are maybe less appreciated nowadays. They may seem old-fashioned now that any-

thing and everything is on a screen, but there remains something about a book that is special to me. I am of the age where "The Cloud" still seems ephemeral, but a book can collect dust on my shelf for decades. They will be a chore that I pass on to my wife or children to deal with as I smile down – hopefully down.

A long-ago teacher of mine would go on his vacation to the beach laden with scholarly books on biblical studies. Now he was exceptional. He loved to read in his chosen field. Beach and book may have been his definition of the perfect use of summertime. I am not as dedicated. I love my *Boston Globe* on the beach, even if the wind does play havoc with the attempt.

But back to summer-time reading. As we finished our Bible study of Mark's Gospel this Spring, we batted around the idea of book club discussion. As I write this article, the 32nd General Synod of the UCC is being held in Milwaukee. The keynote speaker is

Mention is made of another book I read recently on a recommendation of a friend: *Nickle and Dimed. Evicted* can be purchased for \$15 as a book and for \$3 as a download. *Nickle and Dimed* is available for free as a downloadable PDF or again for \$15 as a book. Maybe we could spend some of our summertime reading one of these books and then gathering for a book club discussion in the Fall.

I also throw out *The First Paul* by Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan. Maybe this would be more interesting to a group. The subtitle of the book is "Reclaiming the radical visionary behind the church's conservative icon." Plagiarists stole Paul's name and wrote revisionist Epistles that reversed Paul's original Christian egalitarianism. It is a great read and ties in more specifically with Bible study.

Similarly, I am much impressed by Bruce Bawer's Stealing Jesus: How Fundamentalism Betrays Christianity. Bawer does with Jesus what Borg and Crossan do with Paul. This would be a very interesting read.

For a later time, we may consider the series *Exploring the Bible* that is published by the Massachusetts Bible Society. It consists of three books: *What is the Bible?*, *Introducing the Old Testament, and Introducing the New Testament*. I am looking forward to reading these during some of my summer-time.

Please think about these options and get back to me if you are interested. I hope that there will be enough of us to start an exciting book club discussion when things ramp up in September or October. And just in case people do not read this article, I think I may talk about this in one of my July sermons.

Remember we are the denomination that gave rise to Harvard and Yale. Learning and knowledge, critical thought, creative thinking and inquiry are valued traits in so much of society. Why would we dare imagine that they are not when thinking about God and us as Christians? Reading — what a great way to use this gift of summer-time.

In the 1860's, the Real Folks group donated an E. Howard Gallery Clock to the church. It is currently in the queue at *The British Clock Maker* in Newfane, Vermont waiting to be repaired and refurbished. Ray and Richard Bates are a father and son team who have been in the high-end clock repair business for over half a century. Their work is in such high demand that it may take up to 9 months for them to be able to start their work on our timepiece. This clock is an heirloom that the congregation should be proud of. Accordingly, we are budgeting the funds to restore this clock to its original condition as part of our congregation's 350th anniversary. The estimated cost is \$2,500 - \$2,800. Real Folks has made a generous pledge toward this cost. We are also asking our members to consider a donation.
