Don't get too comfortable = Pentecost

During June we celebrate the birthday of the Christian church on Pentecost and the birthday of the United Church of Christ on the 25th. Both occasions are Spirit-filled and Spirit-led. Where the Spirit plays, the status quo is not one of the rules. Especially when reading the Pentecost story in the Acts of the Apostles, it is clear that when the Spirit is involved, human fears of new frontiers are replaced by a surrender to an overwhelming imagination and freedom to become.

I'm afraid that church sometimes tries to coopt the Pentecost story to legitimate who it is already rather than being inspired by it to imagine and welcome the Spirit's drive toward what the church should become. This is only my orientation, but Pentecost isn't about the past; it skims the present, but its home is the future. Pentecost isn't history; it's journey.

I've heard the Pentecost story told almost as if the church were born like Aphrodite emerging fully formed from the sea. Supposedly, Pentecost imposed church order, structure, hierarchy and orthodoxy immediately and unalterably. This is comfortable for a church made uncomfortable by change, but comfortable is not a descriptive that fits the biblical Pentecost story.

First of all, wind (Acts 2:2) is a Greek word ($\pi vo\eta$, pnoe) used only one other time in the entirety of the New Testament. It is found again in the book of Acts, which speaks strongly to a connection between the two. In Acts 17, Luke tells his readers about Paul's visit to the city of Athens, and there Paul delivers his sermon about the statue to "an unknown god." (17:23)

Paul uses the inscription as an introduction to his remarks during which he states: "'... since [God] gives to all mortals life and $\pi v \circ \eta$..." (17:25) Here, $\pi v \circ \eta$ means breath and it is a part of the hendiadys for *living*. When we connect this usage with wind in the Pentecost story, we have a creative, life-giving and life-sustaining breath of God, not unlike the Genesis creation story of "while a mighty wind swept over the face of the waters." (1:2)

Pentecost is another creation story. This wind is not a calm, summer breeze. This is a *violent* wind,

and the adjective *violent* is used only here in the New Testament. A form of this unique word is used one other time by Luke, but in his Gospel. There it means by force, coercion. This is a Big Bang creation story of church. It is immensely powerful. And while all the laws and contents of creation are present in that Big Bang, there is also chaos, the unknown and unexpected. The "violent wind" of Pentecost is not an "Oh my gosh" it is an "Oh my God!" experience.

God had revealed Himself to Moses in the burning bush as Yahweh, *I Am*, but Everett Fox in the Shocken Bible makes a convincing argument that Yahweh may be translated as *I Will Be There*. Fox's translation emphasizes that God's being, God's nature, is always connected to becoming. God will be there wherever Israel will be, and then the Exodus story begins, the story of Israel's becoming begins.

If we transfer the fire image of the burning bush to the fiery tongues of Pentecost, we continue to hear reference to becoming. And as a matter of fact, the Jewish feast of Pentecost that drew people to Jerusalem in the Acts of the Apostles, is a celebration of the giving of the Law to Moses on Mount Sinai, the place and the persons of the burning bush story. The Torah, the Law, is the sacred foundation of the Jewish faith. The fiery tongues now equate that sacred foundation not with Law, but with Spirit and proclamation and becoming.

The amazing, transformative power of Pentecost is seen immediately in the changed behaviour not only of those who already believe, but in those who are open to belief. The followers of Jesus speak, but some in the crowd hear. Some in the crowd hear drunken babble, but some hear the Word of God. The Spirit is shared widely, in other words, not only within pre-determined boundaries.

This is the Spirit that gives both *life*, the church's beginning, and *breath*, the church's continuing vitality. The emergence of the UCC 62 years ago is a part of this birthing, this Spirit-fueled process of becoming, and we as church right now are as much a Pentecost church as was that first called gathering in Jerusalem. May that inspiration and excitement continue to lead us beyond the comfortable.

SANCTUARY CLOCK

In the 1860's, the Real Folks group donated an E. Howard Gallery Clock to the church. It is currently in the queue at The British Clock Maker in Newfane, Vermont waiting to be repaired and refurbished. Ray and Richard Bates are a father and son team who have been in the high-end clock repair business for over half a century. Their work is in such high demand that it may take up to 9 months for them to be able to start their work on our timepiece. This clock is an heirloom that the congregation should be proud of. Accordingly, we are budgeting the funds to restore this clock to its original condition as part of our congregation's 350th anniversary. The estimated cost is \$2,500 - \$2,800. Real Folks has made a generous pledge toward this cost. We are also asking our members to consider a donation. If you would like to help in this way, your generosity will be much appreciated.
