# June Juneteenth

During June, Alabama and Florida observe Jefferson Davis Day for the disgraced President of the Confederate States. Many southern states observe Confederate Memorial Day in June. Why June? It's intentional, and it's because June 19, *Juneteenth*, marks the day in 1865 when Union Army General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas and issued an order emancipating the last enslaved people in our "land of the free."

It is an attempt to draw attention and responsibility away from the embarrassment and barbarity that was the nation's "peculiar institution," which is the euphemism for slavery. The euphemism was necessary because while the word *slavery* was too embarrassing to speak of in polite society, its reality was not.

On July 4, 1776, the nation and the world recognized the revolution inherent in the words: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." The man who wrote these words owned people and forced himself upon Sally Hemings. The nation that celebrated these words knowingly left four million slaves outside of its parameters.

Juneteenth was only possible after the Civil War was fought because of this detestable institution. Even then, the word *slavery* disappeared, but its effects remained in place through the KKK, Jim Crowe laws, segregation and separate but equal.

1954's Brown vs. the Board of Education and the voting rights legislation of the 1960's were huge steps forward. Martin Luther King Jr's peaceful protests galvanized the nation and brought to light the continuing effects of our "peculiar institution." I believed naively that the election of President Obama was the death knell of institutional racism. I knew there would be pockets of racism and racists, but I thought these would be the dying remnants of a dying screed. I was wrong.

Racism is alive and well, and growing in our country. It can take the form of Confederate Memorial Days scheduled intentionally around the time of *Juneteenth*. It can manifest itself in the daytime murder of Ahmaud Arbery on February 23<sup>rd</sup> in Brunswick, Georgia, but was not seriously investi-



gated until May. There are also the inequalities appearing in the COVID-19 cases. An April

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7<sup>th</sup> article in the *Washington Post* was titled "The coronavirus is infecting and killing black Americans at an alarmingly high rate." The reporters quoted Dr. Fauci as saying that the crisis is "shining a bright light on how unacceptable" those disparities are.

I hate to think that low wage workers, who are often people of color, are forced to work in dangerous conditions during this pandemic because they are desperate and powerless. It would be criminal if meat-packing plants were ordered by the federal government to continue operations so that there are no shortages in our supermarkets without first taking significant action to prevent sickness and death among those workers.

The Southern Poverty Law Center in 2019 was tracking 940 hate groups in our country, 15 here in Massachusetts. <u>https://www.splcenter.org/hate-map</u>

We are in the midst of our 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration. As the history of our congregation makes clear, we have faced and also faced-down prejudice since the 17<sup>th</sup> century (<u>https://www.hatfieldchurch.org/pews-</u> <u>news/category/events-activities</u>). But our stance against prejudice reaches so much further back in our story. At Mount Sinai, God commands: "You shall not oppress a resident alien. You know the heart of an alien for you were aliens in the land of Egypt." (Exodus 23:9) The whole story of Jesus is one of reaching out to the oppressed whether it be Samaritan, women, sinners, tax collectors, etc. and recognizing them all as valued by God. Jesus' in-group is outsiders. All belong in Christ.

In this time of rising racism, let us remember the end of slavery on June 19, 1865, and let us carry its freedom forward so that the long-overdue death of racism and prejudice in all its forms will not be naïve anymore.

## LIVE-STREAMED WORSHIP SERVICES UPDATE

We have been conducting our Sunday worship Services since March 15<sup>th</sup> in tandem with our sister congregation in Whately. Rev. Cynthia and I are working together on the Services, and Anthony has been adding his gift of music. Church Council met on May 24<sup>th</sup> and <u>decided to remain on-line for the month of June rather than take</u> <u>the risk of meeting in person</u>. We meet again on June 25<sup>th</sup> to reassess the situation.

We are hoping to get internet service into the church. This would, at first, allow Anthony and Rev. Randy to lead the worship Service from the church. As it is judged safer, we would then return to church under the protocols Gov. Baker has issued (<u>https://www.mass.gov/lists/safety-standards-for-places-of-worship</u>) and with the recommendations of the Conference (<u>https://www.sneucc.org/phasingforward</u>).

We are looking at an approximate cost of \$75/month to get an internet connection at the church. We are wondering if some of you may be interested in sponsoring any given month for \$50, with the congregation covering the other third of the cost. Three months have already been pledged! dom in Christ, joined together as the United Church of Christ." The 1957 Uniting General Synod declared: "Differences in ecclesiastical procedure, which in sundry places and times have occasioned tensions and disorders, are appointed their second-

ary place and are divested of evil effect." Differences would no longer be of primary concern. Rather, we would raise-up and live Jesus' hope "that they all may be one." (John 17:21). This tenet and foundational belief has led the UCC to be a united and uniting church denomination that seeks to express Christ's extravagant welcome consistently. This year we celebrate and give thanks to God on our 63<sup>rd</sup> anniversary.
