How do we see ourselves as church?

Easter Sunday has come and gone, but the church remains within the Easter Season. We continue to celebrate and contemplate the implications of Jesus' resurrection and the promise of our own. Easter is our greatest joy, and also a part of the wonderful mystery that is Jesus Christ. So of course we still return to the message of the empty tomb, and we will for 50 days.

If the tomb is empty, if the dead body of Jesus is not there to be found, and don't be persuaded by speculations that it was misplaced or even devoured on the cross as carrion because then the non-believing witnesses would have been able to raise these objections, then that means that the resurrected Jesus abides with us and among us.

We need to keep Jesus' presence in all of our calculations as Christians and as church. In such cases, it is not only what you or I as a believer can accomplish nor is it only what we as a church community may accomplish. It is what Jesus is able to do through us and with us. Numbers matter, but so does Easter, and Easter is even more important than the numbers.

Last month I listened in on a webinar produced by the UCC for small churches. One of the definitions of a small church is a part time pastor and a weekly attendance under 80 people. According to this classification, we are a small church.

The sub-categories of the small church were of more interest to me. There were three: not yet big; stable small; and smaller church. Let's start with the smaller church. This was defined as a church becoming "smaller." In other words, a church in decline. The smaller-small church talks about what was and what it did. Its focus is on the past. When it plans for the future, it "calendars." It simply tries to repeat what has always been done.

The stable small church speaks about what is and what it is doing. It looks at the present. Its ministry is the planning needed to maintain its spiritual vitality and its contribution to the communities it nurtures whether they be local or global.

The not-yet-big small church dreams. It looks to the future. It ponders what it might do. It engages in strategic planning, which is planning not only to meet the current needs, but how to be in a position to move forward. It is defined by more than looking at what is. It is motivated by vision, by what can be.

I thought these were helpful designations for us as a small church. They can help us take a better look at ourselves now and discuss who we want to become. In the webinar, they encouraged church members to work together to see if there is a consensus to build upon. The work of church is not a solitary effort. It calls upon all of the members of the community to participate. I'd ask you to read Paul's example of the church as the body of Christ to explain this further – 1 Corinthians 12: 4-27.

It was suggested that congregations look at attendance trajectory, how often visitors join in worship, the impact of the church on the larger community, does the church membership reflect the demographics of the neighbourhoods outside the church, how many members are active in church leadership or organizations, and how engaging is the spiritual life of the congregation.

These are all important questions to be considered by us as members of the church, but we can never forget that it is not only what **we** see, measure, contribute and feel that matters. This is Jesus' church too. The tomb was empty. Jesus is among us. A recurring theme of the resurrection appearances is that Jesus goes unrecognized. He has to say basically, "Here I am." The resurrected Jesus in the church is also often unrecognized.

Sometimes the church is what hides Him. Scandals abound and convince people that Jesus is elsewhere than the institutional church; and sometimes its message is unappealing, outdated and unresponsive; and sometimes people just don't care no matter how hard church tries. Nonetheless, it is up to us, Jesus' co-workers, to say to those outside, to show those outside, that Jesus is here and that Jesus matters, and that begins when we look at ourselves as church and believe and celebrate that the resurrected Jesus abides among us.

SANCTUARY CLOCK

Speaking of the Real Folks Society, back in the 1860's this group donated an E. Howard Gallery Clock to the church. It is currently in the queue at *The British Clock Maker* in Newfane, Vermont waiting to be repaired and refurbished. Ray and Richard Bates are a father and son team who have been in the high-end clock repair business for over half a century. Their work is in such high demand that it may take up to 9 months for them to be able to start their work on our timepiece. This clock is an heirloom that the congregation should be proud of. Accordingly, we are budgeting the funds to restore this clock to its original condition as part of our congregation's 350th anniversary. The estimated cost is \$2,500 - \$2,800. Real Folks has made a generous pledge toward this cost. We are also asking our members to consider a donation. If you would like to help in this way, your generosity also will be much appreciated.
