Thanks for Thanksgiving

Maybe you have seen Tim Burton's *Night-mare Before Christmas*. When I worked at *Yankee Candle* for three years, the *Department 56* figures from this movie were an all-year display. People love them.

Or maybe this month you'll see in one form or another the cartoon of the Thanksgiving turkey yelling at the cartoon Santa to wait his turn, to stop encroaching on Thanksgiving's turf.

Long before the church even enters Advent, which is the season for Christmas preparation, the world is already off to a running start. Christmas really does intrude on Halloween and it overruns poor Thanksgiving.

Halloween is one thing, but Thanksgiving is too important to sacrifice to the reindeer, snowmen and elves who show up when we're still passing out Halloween candy. Instead, let us give thanks for the day of Thanksgiving.

Luke is the only Evangelist who shares the story that Jesus once healed ten people inflicted with leprosy, but only one returned to give thanks. (17:11-19) Thanks-giving faced long odds then and now.

I wonder if thanks-giving is treated lightly because the reality of the present is too often unfairly compared with the massaged memories of the past and the excited imaginations for the future. The present abides in the messiness of reality: its good and bad; its successes and failures. Everything surrounding the present can be remembered or expected as we would prefer, but the inescapable messiness of the present's reality can get in the way of thanks-giving.

The story from Luke 17 is a miracle story. A debilitating disease disappears in an unanticipated moment. The thrill that the ten experience is understandable. They are overcome with emotions and expectations. Life is brand-new and they cannot wait to rush into it. In such an agitated state, forgetting to give thanks is not excusable, but it is somewhat understandable. This makes the intentional return of one of the ten who were healed remarkable. He breaks away

from the others and their rush into new lives, and he comes back to Jesus to give thanks.

Thanks-giving is exceptional, it seems, even in the case of miracles. To hear this Gospel story 2,000 years later makes us gasp in shock that nine took a miracle for granted. We may tell ourselves that it would be different with us. We would give thanks for a miracle. And it's quite possible we would.

However, thanks-giving cannot be limited to the miraculous. This has been a tenet of our faith ever since there was a Christian faith. The oldest book in the New Testament is 1 Thessalonians, and as this pastoral letter comes to a close, Paul admonishes those very first believers to "give thanks <u>in all</u> circumstances." (5:18)

What precipitated the writing of 1 Thessalonians was the reality of death. The community was confused and disconsolate because some among them had died. Paul writes to them of hope, and closes with the exhortation to be ceaselessly thankful, not for the miraculous gifts that didn't occur and prevent death, but for the ordinary gifts that are too often ignored.

During World War II, Norman Rockwell painted a series of four prints based on President Roosevelt's hopes for post-war society. One was *Freedom from Want*. It depicts a family gathered around an inviting but relatively sparse Thanksgiving table. There was thanks-giving without abundance on the table. The present reality of wartime limitations did not hamper thanks-giving. Ordinary gifts were appreciated.

I hope that the Christmas intrusion we already see beginning right now does not overrun the opportunity for the nation to pause, catch a breath, and offer thanks-giving for ordinary blessings, and maybe even those occasional extraordinary ones. The final book within the Book of Psalms begins with this verse: "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures forever." (107:1) May this break into our thoughts however we will be observing Thanksgiving Day for truly God is good.


ONLINE BIBLE STUDY GROUP
